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# The Essex Foundation 2020 Community News

The Essex Foundation continued its community stewardship by supporting several local projects and educational initiatives throughout the past year. Highlights are featured in this issue. Since its founding in1970 as a nonprofit, charitable organization, The Essex Foundation has been dedicated to making a difference in the lives of Essex citizens by providing support for medical, educational, social welfare, cultural, recreational and civic needs. The Foundation's role is to provide "seed money" for new services and to allocate funds to fill needs not met by other charitable organizations or sources. In general, funds are granted for special purposes, including land, buildings, equipment and programs, but not to recurring expenses. With a 50-year history of service to Centerbrook, Essex and Ivoryton, The Essex Foundation continues to expand its support for community projects that require fast, local action, and to work in partnership with town officials, residents and other like-minded organizations.

#### It's Electric!

The first electric vehicle charging station is coming to a parking space near you thanks in part to grant support from The Essex Foundation. The project was conceived by the Sustainable Essex committee, a group of volunteer residents who strive to balance environmental protection, economic development, and social objectives to meet the needs of today without compromising the quality of life for future generations. The group received permission from the Town to place a charging station in the Town-owned parking lot located next to the Essex Town Green and Post Office. The charging station will be a single pole, dual Level-2 charger that can be used for most types of electric cars, and by residents and visitors. The Foundation's grant of \$1257 put the community crowd-funded initiative over its \$7042 goal, triggering another \$7042 in matching funds from Sustainable CT, and the ability to proceed with purchasing and installation before the end of this year.



As trustee for the Bumpy Warner Youth House on Bushnell Street for over 30 years, the Foundation continues to manage and provide support for its maintenance and repair. The building serves as headquarters for the Essex Boy Scout program. The house was a gift of the Gifford Warner family who donated the property in memory of Malcolm "Bumpy" Warner, the son of Enid and Gifford Warner, who died of leukemia.

### **Emergency Preparedness**

After two separate medical emergencies in 2019 at the First Congregational Church (FCC) in Essex Village, its members realized the need for having an automated external defibrillator (AED) on site. Prior to COVID-19 restrictions, the church welcomed over 400 guests, many who are middle-age or older, into the building each week for worship services and various community gatherings including pre-school, 12-step programs, karate, big band and quilting groups. Reverend Kenneth Peterkin reached out to The Essex Foundation requesting financial support for purchasing an AED and a cabinet to house it. The grant request was quickly approved by the Foundation's board members, allowing the equipment to be purchased and installed at the church in February.

An AED is a lightweight, portable device that delivers an electric shock through the chest to the heart to potentially stop an irregular heart beat and allow a normal rhythm to resume following sudden cardiac arrest. With simple audio and visual commands, AEDs are designed to be simple to use for the layperson as well as people with first-aid, first responder and CPR training. According to Reverend Peterkin, "FCC Essex is grateful to receive the grant from The Essex Foundation. Not only do we feel this to be a potentially life-saving item to keep close at hand for our mature Congregation members and our guests from the greater community, as we expand our ministry to become a fine wedding venue, we also feel fortunate to offer peace-of-mind to all those who enter here."

### Power to the People

In early spring, the nonprofit Essex Veterans Memorial Hall in Centerbrook was awarded an \$11,580 grant for the purchase of a standby generator, enabling the building to be used as a community comfort station during prolonged power outages.

### A Welcomed Bright Spot

Thanks to The Essex Foundation's ongoing gateway beautification efforts, 20,000 daffodils enjoyed their first bloom in April on Route 154 across from the Essex fire station. The bulbs were planted in November by Sullivan Lawn Service, which required several crew members and several days to cover the half-acre expanse. Funding for the bulb purchase and planting services came from a bequest to The Essex Foundation by the late Elizabeth Callender, with additional support provided by The Paul Foundation, Centerbrook Properties and individual donations.



### Scholarship Support

The Essex Foundation Board of Directors announced Emma Carey, a graduating senior at Valley Regional High School, as the 2020 recipient of The Elizabeth Barnes Callender and Mary Francis Barnes Memorial Scholarship. The annual award was established to honor the bequest and memory of the late "Diz" Callender and her sister, who both shared a passion for the community and environment. The \$3000 scholarship is available each year to one Valley Regional High School graduating senior or graduate, or an Essex resident who is pursuing studies related to land conservation and preservation at a two or four-year college, a technical school, or graduate school, or taking accredited courses in biology, botany, agronomy, ecology, horticulture, floriculture, forestry, landscape design, or environmental science.

Ms. Carey, an Essex resident, is attending the University of Delaware as an undergraduate student in the Agriculture and Natural Resources program. The award was presented virtually during the high school's senior awards ceremony.

The Essex Foundation also provided scholarship awards for Essex children to attend the Bushy Hill Nature Center day camp this summer. Essex Elementary School submitted the funding request as sponsors of students who otherwise would not have the resources to participate in the outdoor program focused on personal growth and education. This is the second year that the Foundation has awarded grants to to the school to support summer camp experiences for young Essex residents.

A year ago in November we continued our Essex gateway beautification project with the planting of thousands of daffodil bulbs in the field area across from the Essex Firehouse. As we finalized the plans and coordinated the installation, we didn't know that in a few months the world would be besieged by the coronavirus pandemic.
