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Pandemic Planting

In April, 5,000 additional daffodils enjoyed their first bloom on the hill owned by the First Congregational Church in Essex Village. The bulbs were planted in the fall of 2020 by Sullivan Lawn Service, which required a few crew members and a few days to cover the 7500 square-foot area. Funding came from a bequest by the late Elizabeth Callender, with support also provided by The Paul Foundation, Centerbrook Properties, and individual donors.

In general, funds are granted for special purposes, including land, buildings, equipment and programs, but not for recurring expenses. Requests are reviewed by The Essex Foundation Board of Directors and usually require an in-person presentation.

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Helping First Responders Ready for Medical Emergencies

In the winter of 2021, The Essex Foundation answered a call for support from the Essex Fire Engine Company #1 (EFD). A \$10,000 grant was awarded to help fund the replacement of 12 automated external defibrillator (AED) units and two Lucas chest compression systems needed to respond to heart attacks and other cardiac events that happen each year in town. The total cost of the needed equipment and service contracts was \$68,111, which falls outside of the department's normal operating budget.



As first responders who provide medical support to the entire community, and to the Essex Ambulance Association, EFD made a town-wide appeal asking individuals and community organizations for help in closing the gap. It was an easy decision by the Foundation board members to make the award and help assure the fire department is well-equipped and ready to respond.

Each EFD vehicle, as well as the personal vehicles of six EFD emergency medical responders, has an AED on board. The Lucas chest compression units are carried on the department's two light rescue trucks. The Essex Foundation grant was a significant contribution toward the equipment purchase. "Heart disease affects one in four Americans, and is the leading cause of morbidity," commented EFD Chief Aron Schumacher, "At Essex Fire we take cardiac emergencies seriously and we try to have the best equipment possible. Thanks to generous private donors and organizations such as the Essex Foundation this has become a reality."

Scout Support

Funding was provided for the ongoing operation and maintenance of the Bumpy Warner Youth House, which is headquarters for the Essex Boy Scout program, as well as other scout-related projects. The house is located on Bushnell Street and was a gift of the Gifford Warner family who donated the property in memory of Malcolm "Bumpy" Warner, the son of Enid and Gifford Warner, who died of leukemia. As trustee for over 30 years, the Foundation continues to manage and provide support for its maintenance and repair.

Environmental Studies Scholarship Award

Nathan Hill, an Ivoryton resident, was named as the 2021 recipient of The Elizabeth Barnes Callender and Mary Francis Barnes Memorial Scholarship by The Essex Foundation Board of Directors. The \$3000 scholarship award is presented to honor the bequest and memory of the late "Diz" Callender and her sister Mary. It is available each year to one local high school graduating senior or graduate, or an Essex resident, who plans on pursuing studies related to land conservation and preservation at a two or four-year college, a technical



school, or graduate school, or taking accredited courses in biology, botany, agronomy, ecology, horticulture, floriculture, forestry, landscape design, or environmental science. Nathan graduated from Valley Regional in June and is enrolled in the University of Vermont's Rubenstein School of Environment and Natural Resources for the fall semester. His interest and achievement in protecting our natural world and waterways reflects the same passion for the community and environment that Diz and Mary both shared.
